









CONGRATULATIONS to Addison Lash!! The First Trifecta Scout in Baltimore Area Council

Not only is Addison the first Trifecta Scout in Baltimore Area Council (BAC), but he is also the first Quartermaster in BAC in nearly thirty years.

Addison has been a Sea Scout for over 6 years. He started with Sea Scout Ship 361 in Marriottsville, and then he helped start the Sea Scout Ship in Abingdon in 2016. He earned the highest award in Venturing, the Venturing Silver Award in 2014 through Sea Scout Ship 361. Then in 2015 he earned Eagle Scout through Troop 355 in Essex. He completed enough merit badges to earn a Silver Eagle Palm. Finally he earned Quartermaster in Sea Scout Ship 1808 in 2017. By earning the highest award in all three Boy Scouts of America programs, he became the first ever Trifecta Scout in Baltimore Area Council.

Along the way, Addison has held numerous scouting positions. He was a Junior Scout Master with Troop 355. Then Senior Patrol Leader for summer camp in 2014 helping the troop earn the highest award at summer camp that year. He was Boatswain (highest youth leader) in Ship 361 for two years. He then was appointed Baltimore Area Council Boatswain in 2014 and was elected to be Flotilla Boatswain in 2015.

In addition to the highest awards, Addison completed S.E.A.L. - Sea Scout Advanced Leadership, in Seattle in 2015. S.E.A.L. is the only leadership course in Boy Scouts that you can fail, and if you fail you can not take it again.

Addison was awarded the Venturing Leadership Award in 2015 for his involvement in Baltimore Area Council for helping to grow the Sea Scout program and in 2018 he was awarded the Sea Scout Leadership Award for all of his work with starting a new Sea Scout Ship in Harford District and for his continued work in growing the Sea Scout program in the council.

Addison is currently a junior at Massachusetts Maritime Academy. He will graduate MMA with a USGC unlimited tonnage third mate license. His career goal is to become a Chesapeake Bay Harbor Pilot.

The Quartermaster Bridge of Honor was held aboard the Nuclear Ship Savannah on June 30, 2018.

FIRE!! Fight or Flight? What to do when your boat catches fire

"...a good rule for survival on Wall Street: Never agree to anything proposed on someone else's boat or you'll regret in in the morning." —Michael Lewis, Liar's Poker

As I was reading about this, I thought I'd write about it. What DO YOU DO when the alarm goes off?

<u>Answer:</u> Take the toast out of the toaster! Hmmm, true maybe 99% of the time. But it's that last 1% that can be the killer.

There are many things to consider when it comes to responding to a fire, and thinking about them ahead of time is the best way to get it right. Like many emergencies, you're more likely to remain calm if you've thought about it first. But boat fires can go from a wisp of smoke to inferno rapidly, so you have to make the right moves. If not extinguished quickly, the vessel is probably lost.

Fires are deadly anywhere, but boat fires are terrifying. There's nowhere to run. Accordingly, your first thoughts when the alarms sounds should be PFD and locate an escape route. If you are dockside, just get off and call the fire department: getting professionals started your way is always a good move and requires little thought.

If you're at anchor or at sea, your options are fewer: abandon ship or fight. If you're going to fight, you need to know your enemy (fire type), and your weapons (how to put it out).

Likely, you have the minimum number of USCG approved dry chemical extinguishers. They have some pros: easy to use, store well, good range and they do the job fast. And cons: they limit visibility and make breathing difficult in small spaces, and they don't eliminate any legs from the fire triangle ... there is potential for re-ignition.

Likely, you are probably exceeding the requirement. Most dry chemical extinguishers have a BC rating (B is required): they work on flammable liquids or electrical fires. That's a plus, because almost all boat fires start out as one of those. And you have an endless source of Class A extinguisher, water! BUT if you haven't thought about how to make use of these agents, they are less useful. Boat US analysis of claims from fires finds that volunteers asked to use fire extinguishers without having read the instructions frequently failed to put out fires that were perfectly controllable with the equipment at hand.

A gaseous-agent extinguisher, or better, a fixed system in your engine room, is an excellent addition to the requirements. As a bonus, an automatic fixed nozzle system takes all of the thought and most of the reaction out of the process: it goes off when needed and it has been placed to put the fire out. All you have to do is avoid opening the compartment and re-flashing the fire, and call for a tow.

If the fire is in the cabin, you're going to have to fight or flee. In some cases, you may have to fight it or fight through it to get out. Clearing the path to escape should always be the highest priority. And if you do decide to fight, always make sure that escape route is open and easy to follow, even blind. Why blind? Smoke for one thing, and your fire extinguisher for another. To see what deploying a dry extinguisher in your main cabin looks like, do a search for "Yachting Monthly crash boat test fire".

You might note in the video that they had success smothering their test fire with a fire blanket, something few boaters have, but worth considering. If you are forced out of the cabin, try to close the boat behind you, and move to windward. Now, you are no longer in a firefighting mode, it's abandon ship time.

The real answer to "How do you fight a boat fire?" is "Think about it first." If you have a plan before the alarm sounds, you have a much better chance of surviving and saving the boat.

Greetings, boaters! No breaking news in the world of note-taking, thankfully, so here's a check of the newswires:

- DNR reports that as of July 3, Maryland has recorded 11 boating fatalities, two more than for all of 2017. Only one of the 11 victims was wearing a life jacket.
- Since then a lady lost her life after a log canoe racing in the Chester River capsized. According to the Easton Star Democrat, the log canoe *Mystery*, a 32-footer, sailing in the Chester River off Spaniard Point when it capsized about 7:50 p.m. Friday, July 13, with 17 people aboard. Sixteen members of the crew were rescued Friday night. The crew on board said the vessel overturned while making a sharp turn. There was immediate response by the rescue boat for the race, and a very large response by DNR Marine Police, but the lady was not recovered until a local boater found her the next morning, deceased. The victim was reportedly not wearing a life jacket when the boat went over.
- I didn't know what a "log canoe" was, so I looked them up they aren't made of tree trunks tied together like Kon-Tiki, which is what I had imagined; they are long open boats with two masts and lots of sail area but no ballast, and they put a bunch of folks out on long boards that hang off the windward side to offset the tiltage. Looked uncomfortable, and prone to unplanned dunkings. Sad for the victim and her family.
- During the Fourth holiday weekend, nine boaters were arrested for operating under the influence, down two from last year. The highest blood alcohol level among those was 0.22, nearly three times the legal limit.
 Officers issued 181 tickets for other violations, 494 written safety warnings and conducted 1,905 vessel safety checks. WOW!

On a personal note, old S/V Certainty, the Terror of Frogmortar Creek, is finally back in the water, with several fresh coats of white Pettit EZPoxy on the deck, reset portlights, and a spanking new Yamaha 9.9 hp hi-thrust electric-start 25-inch long-shaft hanging on the motor lift on the transom. After a few hours of prepping her and peeling lots of blue masking tape off of the working hardware, we dunked her on the Saturday of the Wurst Cookout, and puttered around the northern Middle River area a little bit to start breaking in the new motor properly, but decided not to go all the way down to Sue Creek that late in the day. Man, that motor really kicks, though – the old Evinrude would push her to maybe 5 knots at Warp 9, but the Yamaha had her running at hull speed (about 7), really a big difference (don't laugh too hard, you power boaters – 7 knots feels fast when you're only a couple of feet from the water). However, she caught a lot of compliments at Parkside Marina, where the neighbors liked her shiny new hide. I made sure to add a lot of high-traction sanded paint to the areas where the Captain has to go – she generally tends to the forward dock-lines, anchor, and mooring duties – and I like that a lot better than the rather worn molded tread that was on the foredeck before. And even better – No water in the bilge! Dry as toast! YAY!

Be safe out there, and watch out for the folks that DON'T take our classes.


