SECRETARY'S REPORT



Well it's a new year and there is some good "stuff" to talk about.

First, the Maryland Department of Natural Resources invites local governments and nonprofit organizations to apply for funding to help restore the Chesapeake Bay and improve water quality.

The department is seeking to fund community projects aimed at mitigating and reducing nonpoint source pollution caused by excess nutrients and sediment through the <u>Chesapeake and Atlantic Coastal Bays Trust Fund</u>. The department plans to <u>allocate and award</u> about \$25 million in 2018. Interested applicants are encouraged to submit letters of intent by Jan. 20, 2017, and full proposals by March 31, 2017.

"The Chesapeake and Atlantic Coastal Bays Trust Fund is a true partnership that leverages resources and talents, and produces measurable and tangible benefits for all," said Maryland Natural Resources Secretary Mark Belton. "The program has quickly become one of the most cost-effective and innovative water quality financing programs in the nation, and is essential to the state's efforts to meet our Chesapeake Bay Watershed Agreement goals and obligations. It incorporates the latest scientific knowledge, and focuses on accountability and results."

The fund helps the state accelerate bay restoration goals by focusing its limited resources on specifically-designed and -implemented projects, and has directed over \$350 million to over 2,000 projects. To date, it has removed 27,000 tons of nutrient and sediment from entering the Chesapeake Bay, and helped restore over 550 acres of wetlands and 222,000 linear feet of stream while supporting 2,000 jobs.

In January 2016, Governor Larry Hogan dedicated

\$53 million for the Chesapeake and Atlantic Coastal Bays Trust Fund, the first time in state history that revenue dedicated to Chesapeake Bay restoration was not diverted or raided. Last year, the fund was able to award funding to 21 individual projects, ranging from Allegany to Wicomico County.

The next good "stuff" is the Natural Resources Police has added a new conservation enforcement tool to its fleet: its own helicopter. The black-and-gold aircraft, (you may hear them on the marine radio, there call sign is "Natural 1"), has resumed its place after a seven-year absence on the department's roster. The helicopter will be used as a surveillance platform to assist Natural Resources Police officers as they patrol 17,000 miles of waterways and nearly a half-million acres of public lands.

About a year ago, the Bell Jet Ranger became available and Natural Resources Secretary Mark Belton sought to obtain the aircraft. His effort paid off and he received the strong support of Governor Larry Hogan. Secretary Belton advised "Natural 1" will assist our officers patrolling our public lands and waters ensuring the safety of our guests and visitors as well as the protection of our most precious natural resources.

On Wednesday, January 11, 2017 at 12:00 pm the Maryland General Assembly will reconvene in Annapolis. My closing good "stuff" is at this writing there does not appear to be any legislation that will have a negative impact on the recreational boater.

New Jersey Marshlands, the Killing Fields

"Whoa, Greenheads. Ya hate 'em right? I HATE 'EM MY-SELF!" —modified from Beetlejuice "Sandworms"

After entering Manasquan Inlet we slowed while pondering our next move. Our rudimentary on board electronics, George's iPhone, indicated a route that was not readily apparent. Everything looked like busy residential shoreline and shallow sandy beach area. There was plenty of meandering boat traffic with none showing us the way. We tracked the markers as best we could and entered the house lined Point Pleasant Canal, and finally settled in to the first part of NJ ICW at the top of Barnegat Bay. Wide and well-marked, it was easy going.

I'm not sure where we stayed on the western shore that night. Per the book, it fulfilled our needs of water, power and shower. I recall calling ahead and being told we could stay in any empty slip. We did, and found that this was a very quiet place. The lighting was dim, there were no showers, no office and no people. A map search showed the nearest eatery, the county's best Asian buffet, to be about a mile and a half away. We could use the

walk.

The next day human occupied shoreline ended and passed through miles of Wildlife Refuge. All along we had been spotting plenty of wildlife to include porpoises, jet skis, fish jumping, Ospreys always in sight, and the occasional Eagle. This grassy marsh area introduced us to our first of many encounters with clouds of inch long greenhead flies, well known and hated, nay feared, by me from my childhood Ocean City, NJ beach days. Put 12 of them together and you have a foot long nightmare!

<u>Tabanus nigrovittatus</u>, known by many "green" names, is a biting horse-fly commonly found around coastal marshes of the Eastern US. The biting females are a considerable pest to both humans and animals while they seek a source of blood to produce eggs. Females live for three to four weeks and may lay about 100 to 200 eggs per blood meal. Respectfully submitted,



Navigators Piloting and Charting Reference Card

The Navigators Piloting and Charting Reference Card puts the commonly used coastal navigation formulas and symbols on one handy card for easy reference. This card helps prevent mistakes when tired, or when doing your Navigation Class homework.


Even with today's use of GPS and chart plotters, being able to calculate Speed / Time / Distance as well as properly plot a course on a chart is a useful skill. Electronics can fail and if you take a Coastal Navigation Class or Coast Guard Masters Class you will get to know very well the formulas and constants on the Navigators Piloting and Charting Reference Card.

Having the most commonly used formulas in one place for easy reference and not on scraps or paper that seem to get lost at the critical time, prevents a lot of stress and helps prevent mistakes from using the wrong formula because of being tired.

The Time / Distance / Speed calculations are already worked out, but the good old "60 D Street" circle is also on the Navigators Piloting and Charting Reference. To use the "60 D Street" circle place a finger over the variable needed and the formula for that variable are the variables you can see arranged in the proper order.
