

Do You Have Caller ID?

Perhaps you need a 406 EPIRB. Emergency Position Indicating Radio Beacons are emergency transmitters which provide timely, accurate information to rescue agencies to expedite finding an emergency location. The practical application to boaters is to automatically send for help in the event of capsizing or other catastrophic event when the pilot may be incapacitated or otherwise engaged. EPIRB's are especially recommended for offshore cruising where they have saved numerous lives.

There are two categories of EPIRB's available analog (121.5 MHZ) and digital (406MHZ and a 121.5MHZ honing signal). Needless to say, like everything else today digital is the latest and greatest. Class A and B are analog; Category I, II, and PLB's (Personal Locator Beams) are digital. Class A and Category I float free and turn on automatically, they should be stored outside the cabin so they can float to the surface in a emergency. Class B and Category II must be manually engaged.



Pre-registrations for two fall GPS classes have been too few, but Rolf is committing to run the 10 November class at St. John's, regardless of how few attend.


